

DESIGN & TECHNOLOGY Year 11 have been finishing off their projects that consist of everything from stools to sports memorabilia holders. Year 10 have been getting back to practical work learning about routers, vacuum moulding and pewter casting using the brazing hearth. KS3 has seen mainly preparation work with Year 9 designing clocks in 2D-DESIGN; Year 8 are using the same programme to design a pewter casting, while Year 7 are working on laser cut photo stands.

MATHS

It is music to the ears to hear the footsteps of our students in the Maths corridor again. The classrooms are filled with excitement and the eagerness to learn. Finally, face to face teaching resumes!

While the Year 7s have been busy exploring the world of angles, Year 8 have been learning all about metric units and conversions. Did you know that the first speed limit was introduced by the United Kingdom in 1861 with a maximum speed of just 10mph? Imperial units were used back in the 19th century and was the unit of measurement until SI units (Système International d'Unités) were introduced in 1960. Most countries adopted this metric unit of measurement (kilometres rather than miles) and converted measured road



distances and speed limits to kilometres (km) and kilometres per hour (km/h). The UK, USA and Canada retained the traditional mph unit as well as numerous UK colonies as shows in the table above.


Year 9 and 10 have been exploring the world of fractions after emerging from lockdown. The rational behind this is that fractions are a very specific point within the curriculum. They are of crucial importance for later mathematics, and without facility with fractions many of the subjects central to STEM, and more broadly, fully participating in the modern world, are simply out of reach. Hence, we have ensured that the students get plenty of practice through differentiated questions in class and homework.


Year 11s have been busy preparing for their upcoming examinations. We want to take this opportunity to wish them they very best in the coming weeks. May their hard and dedication pay off.

After Easter we will be starting a History Club, a place where you can come and learn about parts of History that we don't have time to study in our lessons.



PERFORMING ARTS





DANCE

Year 7: This term Year 7 students have been exploring Brazilian Dance! This includes the styles of Samba and Capoeira, with an emphasis on Capoeira once we returned to school. This week, students performed a short routine to self-assess their own blended learning - as half of this term was delivered online and the rest in school. It is really great to have them back in the studio, and see the energy and enthusiasm in person!

Year 8: At the beginning of term, Year 8 were creating their own TikTok dance at home, however when we got the thumbs up to be back in school, I decided to flip the topic to one that is more cardio based and with the possibility to be outside. Therefore in these last 4 weeks, we have been exploring parkour and Site Specific! The students are creating routines that are designed for specific environments and with props and obstacles.

Year 9: Time to get technical - this term Year 9s look at basic Ballet and the musical Billy Elliot! Although many get worried about studying ballet, this term is all about breaking down those stereotypes, gender assumptions and exploring Ballet in a fun, creative and narrative way. The story of Billy Elliot resonates even more so today, and challenges what is said to be 'masculine' or 'feminine'. As this is one of the last terms that all Year 9s will be doing before going into their GCSE subject groups, it seemed necessary to end with one of the hardest styles of dance, and give everyone an opportunity to show how much they have learnt over the last 3 years.





Year 10: Similar to the Year 9s, my GCSE Year 10 group have also been studying ballet. Whereas in this class, we take it up a notch and introduce the barre, with exercises executed in traditional ballet classes. This is accompanied with a contemporary/ballet dance in which the students helped to shape by using the approach SHOW-MAKE-TASK. This is used by Wayne McGregor, a choreographer for the Royal Ballet, who also produced the work 'Infra'. This is the professional work the Year 10s are exploring in their theory lesson. The Year 10s have done some great theory work over remote learning, so I am cranking up the level of intensity in the studio,to make up for lost time! And also prepare the students physically for a possible dance show in the summer...?! Fingers crossed!

Year 11: The Year 11 students are busy. busy! This week was their NEA in dance, we wish them luck! They performed their Trio, choreographed by the teacher and also their own Choreography which they have been working on over lock-down. I have really enjoyed seeing these.

MUSIC

In Music this term we have used our retrieval practice to remember the different musical elements and put them into practice.

This term **Year 7** have begun to read sheet music focusing on pitch and rhythm. Our Year 7s are learning to play the very famous 'Ode to Joy' by Beethoven by not only reading sheet music but enhancing their keyboard skills too!

Year 8 are also enhancing their keyboard skills too, by playing various different elements of Blues music. All of Year 8 are playing the 12 bar blues with a walking bass line and some are even retrieving their memory of playing from sheet music by playing Glen Millers 'In the mood' melody line.

Year 9 have been continuing their work from lockdown. They have been planning their music event, thinking about promotion, health and safety, pricing, jobs etc.

Year 10 are finishing their first composition piece and consolidating their learning of Killer Queen by practising exam style questions and comparisons between Killer Queen and some unfamiliar listening pieces.

Year 11 are completing their final pieces of coursework- performance and composition. The standard of work Year 11 are producing is fantastic and they should be so proud of the hard work they have put into their work.

DRAMA

Students have returned with great enthusiasm to their drama lessons. Here's a snapshot of what we've been studying this term in the Drama Studio:

Year 7 – This term, we have been exploring the performance style of Melodrama. We have studied its origins in Victorian theatre, some of the typical storylines and many of the key features of the performance style. Many students have needed little excuse to show their melodramatic sides and it has been great to see the confidence of performance begin to return more and more each week!



Year 8 – The unit of work we have been looking at this term is called *Devising Based on Human Rights*. In this unit, we use many resources from Amnesty International and also important works from the literary world to gain a better understanding of what Human Rights are and the work that charities like Amnesty International do around the work for those who've had their Human Rights abused. Many students have provided thoughtful reflections and have shown empathetic understanding of the hardships for many around the work and this had led to some considerate performance work.



Year 9 – Having studied Willy Russell's *Blood Brothers* in Lockdown, we have come back to the studio to tackle some of the key scenes of this play in a more practical way. Whilst exploring the context of the play, we have been developing our performance skills, group working skills and interpretive skills with some engaging performance work.

Year 10 – This term, Year 10 Drama students have been applying a practical approach to the study of their set text for their written exam that they will take at the end of year 11. In addition to realising key scenes, developing understanding of character, context, theme and plot, students have also learnt about motif and montage. After Easter, Year 10 Drama students will begin their first NEA (non-examined assessment) which is worth 30% of their final grade.

Year 11 – Year 11 Drama students have been going full steam ahead as they have been preparing for their individual performances of monologues for their final NEA. The monologues have been taken from plays by John Godber which explore the realities and tragedies of nightlife culture in Northern England in 1980s/90s. The students have been working hard to learn their lines and perfecting their Yorkshire accents!
