YEAR 10 & 11



**Welcome back MECE English Department!**


What a wonderful start to the year! Our students have already achieved so much and have had a great start to their new academic year.

**YEAR 10**

Year 10 are back and ready to start their GCSEs! We are incredibly proud with the return of year 10 and their hard work thus far.

They have begun their GCSE units, starting with Poetry Anthology, Power and Conflict Unit. They began this unit last year, therefore giving us the ability to spend a bit more time, solidifying their skills. Students have focused more on essay writing and comparison writing, in order to develop and help their skills as they progress through each unit.

**YEAR 7**

Year 7 have settled in greatly with their new routines, expectations and way of learning. Year 7 have been studying 19th Century texts this half term, focusing on the language used in order to create an effect for the reader. They have explored this through their own creative writing and understanding the life of a 19th Century child. A few of the different texts we have studied include: Great Expectations, Oliver Twist and The Water Babies.

YEAR 8

Year 8 have returned to school, eager and ready to learn! Year 8 have been studying Of Mice and Men this half term and they have massively enjoyed the challenge attached to the novel. Analysing the difficult language used, understanding key themes and ideas and relating this to modern issues. Year 8 have been improving their reading aloud skills, group work and continued to work on their PETZAL paragraph writing.

YEAR 9


Year 9, over the last half term, have been focusing on our 'Dare to Scare' unit. This unit allows the students to engage in different short stories that link to a gothic genre, learning and exploring the use of language and looking at why the writer has conveyed their characters, setting and mood, in this specific way. They have developed their analytical writing throughout this unit and have been given the opportunity to further these skills linking to GCSE criteria.

YEAR 11

Year 11 – final year, meaning **WE MUST FOCUS!**

Year 11 have had a solid and engrossed return to MECE. We have begun our Macbeth unit, to which the students have massively enjoyed!

Year 11 have been reading each act and scene, annotating the language and then exploring the characters, themes and techniques used. This unit is an important factor within their GCSEs, therefore the focus and detail that has been given so far is important.



MATHS

It has been an excellent start to the new year getting to know our new Year 7s and greeting the returning Years 8-11.— **Mr Jones**

YEAR 7

Our year 7s have been working on developing their number skills, involving integers, rounding, indices, factors, multiples and prime numbers. The higher set have also been delving into standard form and algebra.

YEAR 8

Our amazing year 8s have been working on 3-D forms, volume and surface area, and looking at real life graphs such as speed-time and



distance-time graphs with a mind to interpreting the gradients of graphs, on acceleration and speed. Our top set 8s have also been working on accuracy and error bounds and are just now developing their understanding of transformations, and should be working on constructions and loci in the near future.

YEAR 9

Our hard-working year 9s have also been working on their number skills delving deeply into integers, decimals, indices and roots, and are now working on factors multiples and primes. The top set have also completed units on standard form and surds, along with delving into the further mathematics topics for the product rule for counting, indices and surds, which take them beyond the GCSE course with the plan for some of them to get an extra GCSE in further mathematics.

The ever-resilient year 10s are revising their skills involving Integers and place value, decimals, indices and roots, along with factors multiples and primes, and are now starting to delve into algebra. Our top set has been working on fractions, percentage, ratio and proportion and angles in and about polygons and parallel lines, and should hopefully be able to start work with Pythagoras and trigonometry before the end of the term.

YEAR 7

Welcome to MECE Dance! I am super happy to share a brand-new scheme of work based around the Marvel Universe.



This year, the Year 7s are looking at creating stylistic movements and gestures, and exploring diverse characters, particularly from the Avengers. Alongside learning key subject vocabulary which will be vital to their KS3 dance journey. This last week, pupils have performed their whole Marvel dance and received their first written feedback and their current 'working at' grade. YEAR 7

Year 7 have been furthering their understanding of the instruments of the orchestra and developing their knowledge of the musical elements by composing their own music to a picture of their choice.

Year 11 are readying themselves for their written exam at the end of the year by continuing their study of Willy Russell's musical Blood Brothers.




