YEAR 10 & 11



I was lucky enough to accompany Year 10 Art & Photography on their trip to Cotswold Wildlife Park. The students were fantastically well behaved, and it was a pleasure to spend the day with them. The majority of Year 10 have started with a very positive attitude to their GCSE courses and are working well, but a few need to remember to keep up to date with homework and put that extra effort in. Part of the tutor routine are recap & revision activities to get that knowledge embedded from the core subjects. Science have been completing assessments so students have had the opportunity for a progress check.

Year 11 have been attending their afterschool revision sessions ahead of their PPE examinations. These PPE exams are so important as these grades are often used by colleges and sixth forms in their application process when issuing conditional offers. The PPE exams start after half term.

So far, Year 11 have taken part in the UNLOC Enterprise Day and demonstrated excellent entrepreneurial skills and have submitted CVs and covering letters ahead of their mock interviews. There has been lots of information about post-16 provisions and careers support, with information assemblies hosted by BCA, Reading College, Piggotts School and Highdown Sixth Form Centre. Next will be the Taster Day Sessions at Henley College in November - more information to follow. Year 11 have also started thinking ahead to fundraising for their Prom so expect some exciting ideas coming after the exams!

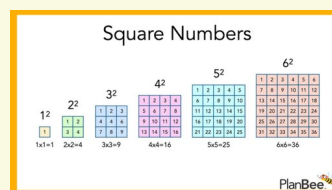

MATHS

YEAR 7

At the start of this term, we welcomed the new Year 7s who have set off on a flying start. They have been studying whole numbers, decimals, rounding, discovering negative numbers and all about the special numbers: squares, cubes, roots and writing powers. The higher track have



also been working hard on numbers but going into more depth and finding error interval and working with numbers in standard form. During the end of this half-term, Year 7



students have also been given the opportunity to celebrate Black History month by learning about the African – American astronomer and mathematician Benjamin Banneker and creating some wonderful clocks which we will report about in the next newsletter.

YEAR 8

Year 8s this first half – term have concentrated more on shapes, finding areas and volume and working on graphs. The higher track have also been solving quadratic equations in various methods.

YEAR 9

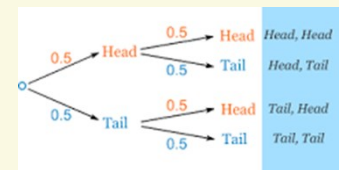
Year 9 higher track have truly risen to the challenge of our ambitious curriculum and have been working on surds at

grade 7/8. The other Year 9 students have also been working on numbers, rounding, estimating, factor trees and other special numbers. They have also been attempting various money problems to develop their reasoning.

YEAR 10

Year 10s higher track have been transforming shapes and developing their fluency in constructions and loci and expanding multiple brackets towards the end of this half-term. The rest of Year 10 have revisited shapes, area and volume and developed their graphing skills and interpretation.

YEAR 11



Year 11s have started the year studying about probability, and in particular; tree diagrams, quadratic expressions and equations and graphs. They have also been revising and preparing for the November PPEs. We encourage all Year 11s to spend some time revising during the half-term break using materials that have been provided by teachers and online websites such as Hegarty Maths and corbettmaths.com.

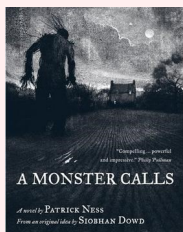


As a department we have hosted Debate Club and Creative Writing Club. Miss Jackson and Mrs Hussain have also been working closely with

the Reading Ambassadors about some upcoming projects – watch this space!!

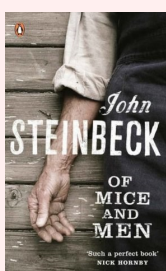
YEAR 7

This half term year 7 have been reading *A Monster Calls*, a class favourite. They have been working explicitly on language analysis and developing their vocabulary. Year 7 have made a great start to MECE and we have been overwhelmed with their amazing support of the English department! Their homework unit this term has been completing a booklet, which they have taken pride in doing each week and are always very keen to show their teachers what they have done.



Students have began reading at the start of every English lesson and we have noticed how engaged the year 7s are during this time and their love for reading is very clear.

YEAR 8

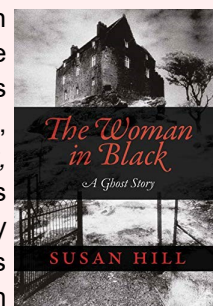


This half term year 8 have been looking at *Of Mice and Men*. As a department, we have been blown away with the progression they have made over the summer holidays, they have shown maturity when reading such a difficult text with complex themes. We have focused on many important aspects of

the novel this term, especially with Black History Month being a prominent element that we wanted to highlight through the use of literature. Year 8 were given a homework menu this term and they have thoroughly enjoyed ticking off each task they have completed each week. They have been working hard on their character analysis and connecting different points of the novel to the character's feelings. This half term, year 8 have also begun their speaking and listening practicing for their end of term assessment. This involved them working in groups to create an argument/speech towards a statement given to them. This activity worked incredibly well and it was very clear to see the knowledge from the past 7 weeks being shared in groups and collated into a speech.

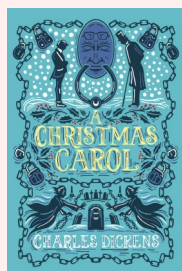
YEAR 9

Year 9 have been focusing on language paper 1 written skills. We have been looking at short extracts linking to the 'dare the scare' unit, such as *Dracula*, *Woman in Black*, *The Birds* and so on. This has involved zooming in on key techniques and analysis of the texts and trying to develop an understanding of why the writers have chosen the style of writing and what effect this has on the reader. The students have been able to identify key horror motifs and have been able to use this to also write their own horror stories, involving key techniques. We have been very pleased with year 9's engagement throughout this term.



YEAR 10

What a great start year 10 have had to the start of their GCSEs! Year 10 have come back to school with a bang and we have been delighted with the hard work they have shown already! This half term year 10 have been looking back over *A Christmas Carol*, however this time, they have been developing their analysis of the text and working exceptionally hard to develop their



writing skills also. We have been very impressed with the maturity they have shown thus far and the clear dedication they have to their GCSEs. Over the next term they will be continuing annotations to wider their knowledge of the text. Keep up the amazing work year 10!!!

ENGLISH

YEAR 11

We still can't believe that this cohort is officially Year 11! This term Year 11 have been focusing on *Macbeth*, they have been annotating the play, learning quotations, debating about characters and developing their analytical skills through essay writing. The discussions in lesson time have been amazing to hear and to be a part of, as it shows the students have a clear understanding of the text and the ideas within. We have been very proud of the work shown in lesson time and the ideas that have been shared from pupils. We are using challenging questions to develop their understanding further and challenging them to aim for the best possible outcomes. Year 11 recently had a revision session after school which involved a walking-talking-mock. This worked extremely well as students were able to see model answers and then develop their own writing, having seen what is expected from the mark scheme.

your quotations, practicing your timed writing skills and continue to work hard in all lessons! Keep up the great work year 11!!

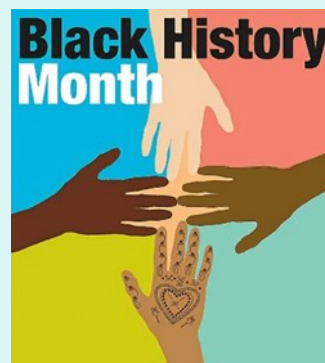

HUMANITIES

HISTORY

October is International Black History Month in the UK and this year's theme is 'Sharing Journeys' - an exploration of the lives and stories of the people who came to Britain in the 19th and 20th centuries and helped lay the foundations of today's diverse Black British Community. Whilst this is something we study in history throughout the year, we want to take some time in October to really focus on this. During our assemblies, Miss Shepherd has been sharing different stories of inspirational black people, celebrating black achievement as well as aiming to challenge some of the racial stereotyping and discrimination that is still prevalent in our society today. She taught everyone about Kemi Badenoch, the politician who overcame significant challenges to become a contender for Prime Minister.

During lesson times, we have been studying a range of black history, from the North Africans who built Hadrian's Wall in AD122 as well as looking at different black Tudors and the influence of black jazz during the Weimar Republic. The hope is that students understand and embrace the beautiful diversity of history and learn to challenge misconceptions about racial history.

GEOGRAPHY



YEAR 7

I have been so impressed with their knowledge and enthusiasm for the subject so far. Their workbooks are a delight too. They have been investigating some amazing places from around the world including Antarctica, The Serengeti, Yellowstone National Park and Disney theme parks and discovering what geography is all about.

YEAR 8

Students have been building on their field work skills from Year 7 and this time investigating the school environment. They have discussed primary and secondary data, sampling techniques as well as writing a formal report based on their findings. As always, evaluating the methods used and questioning the reliability of their results are important parts of the enquiry process.



YEAR 9

Year 9 have been looking at world population change and how some countries try to manage their population growth. Lots of interesting



discussions points about China's One Child Policy. Has it been a success? I look forward to reading their extended pieces of writing.

YEAR 10

A term spent focusing on natural hazards, in particular tectonic hazards. Students have been looking at why volcanoes and earthquakes occur at different plate margins and how humans respond to living in areas at risk. They have been comparing two earthquakes in detail (Chile and Nepal) and evaluating whether long term responses are more important than short term responses.

YEAR 11



Year 11 have been discussing really challenging questions about the changing economic world and how the gap between rich and poor countries could be reduced.

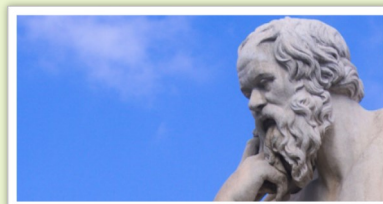
More recently they have been preparing for their trip to Amersham field study centre. Here, they will investigate how the River Chess changes downstream. This is their second compulsory fieldwork after a rather wet visit to Henley in July. Fingers crossed for better weather this time!

CLUBS AHoy!



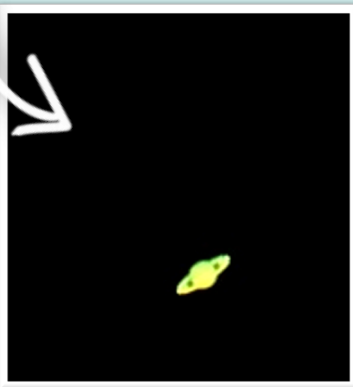

FOOD



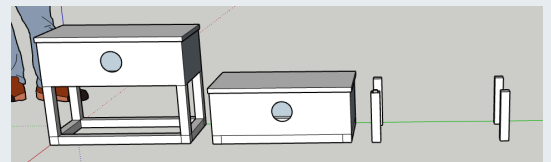

DRAMA

Rehearsals are in full swing in the Performing Arts department. Those in the cast have been involved in acting, singing and dance rehearsals as we prepare for our production of *A Christmas Carol* this December. Year 7

Year 7 this term have really impressed Mr. Harte and Miss Gardner with their work on duologues. Students across the year group were thrown in the deep at the start of the year by performing a two-person scene in front of their entire class by their third week at MECE. The quality of these performances from the enthusiastic students who had learnt their lines off by heart was really exciting to see!

Year 8

In year 8, students have been looking at a story of a boy called Joe who is experiencing lots of challenges in his life. Through performance and drama, we have been exploring how this character might be supported and how they might be affected by the variety of social issues they are experiencing. We have been aiming to engage with this serious subject matter with maturity and sensitivity as we develop our empathy and understanding of some challenging subject material.

Year 9

For students in year 9, we have been looking at how to successfully create mood and atmosphere on stage by focusing on the more subtle and intense side of performance. Aiming to

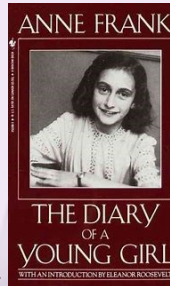
create dramatic tension on stage, students have explored how lighting, sound, use of silence and use of voice can be employed to have a direct impact on an audience.

Year 10

Year 10 have made excellent progress this term in the quality of their performance work. Now armed with a better understanding of structure, stage configuration and communication of meaning to an audience, students have been applying their newly acquired knowledge to performances inspired by the life and diaries of Anne Frank.

Year 11

As our older students embark on their final year at MECE, year 11 drama students have been revisiting their set text of *Blood Brothers* with lots of exam practice. Lots of progress is being made in the quality of analytical and evaluative writing which is promising as the students



approach their upcoming set of PPEs. I hope the revision books that have been lent will be well thumbed over the coming weeks and months!

MUSIC



Year 7

Year 7 have been developing their instrumental skills on both keyboards and ukuleles. They have learnt to play chords on both instruments which we have used to play a variety of popular songs, including Happier by Marshmello and Counting Stars by One Republic. They have also completed a listening and rhythmic baseline assessment and are about to start developing their vocal skills which they will then combine with their keyboard / ukulele skills in group performances.

Year 8

Year 8 have also been using keyboards to develop their understanding of chords and harmony. They have combined chord sequences with bass lines to good effect, whilst developing their understanding of structure and texture. This is to improve both their solo and ensemble performance skills. They are moving on to study riffs and hooks (the parts of the song that get stuck in your memory!) increasing their understanding of musical notation at the same time.

Year 9

Year 9 have focused on the structure and texture of popular songs and have learnt melodies, chord sequences and bass lines. The music we have covered ranges from the Beatles and Ben E King to Jessie J and Emile Sande. They have used a variety of instruments including keyboards, guitars and ukuleles. This is to improve both their solo and ensemble performance skills. They are developing their musical skills in preparation for choosing their own pieces to enter a 'Battle of the Bands' style competition.

DANCE FROM SUMMER TERM 2022

Please accept our apologies, last term's dance article and dance show celebration was missed out of the summer issue of MECEmatters in error. We have published it here for you to enjoy, please remember that this celebration applies to last year's Year 7, 8 & 9, and 10.

Year 7

Last term, our year 7 pupils embarked on an exploration of Brazilian dance, with emphasis on Capoeira. This style of dance combines martial arts, music and dance with particular movements and 'game' style performances. This term, year 7 pupils have been exploring Contemporary Dance. This



includes looking at pioneers such as Martha Graham. The pupils explored floor-work and contact-work, before creating a motif themselves, combining their years' worth of dance experience to create one last routine for year 7. Congratulations year 7 on your introduction to dance this year and I look forward to developing on this foundation next year.

Year 8

Last term pupils were introduced to 'Swan Song'; a dance piece that stems around the topic of the UN declaration of human rights and the work of Amnesty International. The pupils create a narrative in their



groups in keeping with the theme of Swan Song whilst developing their knowledge on the style of contemporary and contact work. This term has been a pivotal term for year 8 - their topic is 'Learning through Literacy', whereby the pupils use

English language and literature to create and develop movements. Using stimuli's such as William Wordsworth's poem 'Daffodils' as well as recipes and the use of adverbs, adjectives, similes and metaphors to initiate movement. The reason this term is very different and important is that there is no modelling from the teacher - all material comes from them! Well done to all those in year 8 on another great year!



Year 9

Last term, year 9s were introduced to the piece 'Sutra', which is studied at A-level dance and therefore suggests the level at which the pupils were being challenged. The styles included in this piece, and embodied during the term, include Kung Fu – a martial art, and Capoeira. The pupils created a duet, therefore expanding their choreographic abilities with less input from others and the teacher.

Similar to the year 8s - this term is all about the year 9 pupils creating their own dance performances. The idea is to create a dance that others can join in with, like a TikTok dance. The pupils are advised on how to develop a piece using actions, space, dynamics and relationships, but everything else, including the choice in music, comes from themselves! It is a fun and adventurous last term, combining all the 3 years' worth of dance experience into one final KS3 routine. 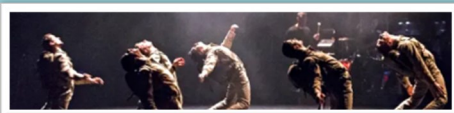


Year 8

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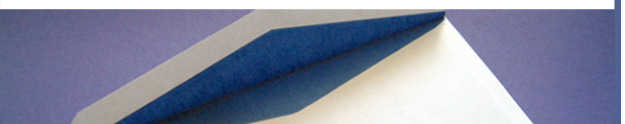


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
