

She still uses powerful language but since falling for Richard's manipulation "grossly grew captive to his honey words" she has become trapped in an unhappy marriage. In the funeral procession scene, she cursed Richard for killing her husband and father but in marrying him the curse has fallen on her "subject of my own soul's curse". This is an example of witchcraft commonly seen in Shakespeare's plays because King James I and the Salem witch trials taking place in England. This is a contrast to her previous husband who was viewed as a saint "angel husband" meaning that when Richard killed him he was disrupting the Great Chain of Being, meaning nature itself will be after him and since she is aligned with him she will also receive the wrath of God for his heinous crimes.
