Dear Parents and Carers,

I hope you and your families are keeping safe.

This situation not easy and I appreciate, like many staff across the Trust, you are juggling work (whether at home or not) supporting your children, caring for family members and taking care of yourself. We do understand this and that you can only do your best – and that is fine. Well done on all you are doing.

Education provision

Our Secondary Hub and Great Hollands Primary School both continue to welcome students who are working hard and participating well in the life of the schools. Alongside that, staff continue to set learning activities for all students across the Trust and, having seen what the pupils and students are producing, I am hugely impressed with the young people and grateful with your support.

With regard to Year 11 and Year 13 provision, now that most of the courses have concluded, the schools are developing packages of work to support transition. Some of these are up and running already and others will be available shortly. For example, Year 13 students have been given links to free **Massive Open Online Courses (MOOCs)** to help them prepare for university.

Pastoral Care during Lockdown

As well as continuing to provide education for your children, our staff have been providing pastoral care too. Students at our special school, Hamilton, are being contacted daily by staff. At Great Hollands Primary School staff are in regular telephone contact with lots of their families. At the time of writing, our three secondary schools had logged just over 2000 welfare calls and emails to students and families. We know how important these contact points are for some children and our staff will continue to check in for as long as the situation lasts.

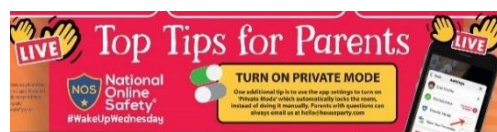
