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
Message from Andy Hartley Headteacher

SCIENCE

I would also like to thank the students and parents for their patience during this academic year. My daughter is called Sofia and is already enjoying reading about Science!



Mrs Hardman

Year 7 - Currently doing fantastically well studying plants with Miss Swayne.

- We will be running a sunflower growing competition (the tallest wins). We have sent out postcards with one seed sellotaped to the back, instructions are on Google Classroom.
- We are running an 'ask a scientist' exercise we have uploaded a Bio of Dr Wood a plant scientist working at CABI and students are submitting questions. We have passed any student questions to her, she is making a video and we will upload it as soon as we get it!
- We are working on a 'virtual field trip' for year 7 when we move onto Ecosystems. We are also programming some 'live discussions' with some scientists in different ecosystems so students can ask questions.

Year 8 - Currently doing really amazing work studying Space with Mr Allum.

- We are running an 'ask a scientist' exercise we have uploaded a Bio of Dr Chandresh a scientist working at Johnson Matthey and students have submitted questions. Dr Chandresh will be responding after half term.
- We are making suggestions to families to take part in Mission X: Train like an Astronaut. The competition has been extended until September.
- We have an exciting opportunity for Dr Joly a STEM ambassador (astronomer) to give a 'live lecture' about space! This will be happening after half term.

Year 9/10 - brilliant work has been seen from both these year groups.

All studying different things! We also have the 'ask a scientist' running - but, with a more career slant. Students can submit questions and scientists will answer via video. I am hoping to secure a video chat for students with some rollercoaster designers at Thorpe Park! This ties in well with their studies on motion and forces.

We are very much looking forward to teaching Year 10 both online and in school after half term, Mrs. Hardman will be taking these sessions and there will be support available via google classroom after the lessons.

PERFORMING ARTS

Drama

Years 7, 8 and 9 This term, students were challenged to find, learn and perform a monologue of their choosing. In the first week, students searched for a monologue that they connected with, or some chose to set themselves an even greater challenge by selecting a monologue from a Shakespeare play. In the second week, the students were given a number of methods used by actors to help learn their lines. There are lots of memory tricks that are helpful for learning lines, and for memorising facts, dates, key events etc! After this, it was performance time! For this part of the process, I gave students the option of performing to a family member and writing some feedback from their audience. I hope that many of you were impressed at home if you were one of the audience members! It's very challenging to perform to a small audience, especially one made up of your family!

The other options for the performance were to either record an audio performance, or to video the performance of the monologue and send them in to me. I had a wonderful week watching and listening to some excellent performances. I heard performances from Donald Trump, Hamlet, Juliet (from Romeo and Juliet), one hilarious old lady, scary characters from anime, Neville from Harry Potter and loads more. I was really impressed with the range of choices and the vocal skills used. I have always been impressed with the incredible talent our small school has and these monologues were a firm reminder of that!

Year 10 Drama GCSE students must have worn several pens out with the work they have been producing in Drama! They have been working diligently on a key part of their written exam: Willy Russell's Blood Brothers. I have been really impressed by the hard work that Year 10 students have been doing. The work they are doing now will become much of their revision material for next year, so I am pleased that it is being done to such a high standard!

Dance

Year 7 Dance:

In year 7 dance, we have been exploring Samba dance this term! Strictly Professional Oti has been leading our pupils through a Samba dance via YouTube, and has inspired some households to all take part in the lessons! The pupils were also very briefly introduced to a performance of 'A Linha Curva' - a dance piece about Brazilian culture that includes Samba and Capoeira. This piece is studied at GCSE level Dance.

Year 8 Dance:

GET YA HEAD IN THE GAME! Our year 8 pupils have been exploring musical theatre dance this term through looking at High School Musical! They were taught the main dance routine in 'All in this together' and the 'Wildcats' routine, which was taught by none other than the actual cast members (including my personal favourite, Zac Efron!). Last lesson pupils learnt the 'Get Ya Head in the Game' with the added challenge of practising with a basketball. GO WILDCATS!

Year 9 Dance:

TikTok time! After delivering this unit to the year 8s last term, I decided to that the Year 9s might really enjoy this unit too, with a little extra challenge included. I am sure there may be many a MECE pupil out there trying out TikTok challenges with family for fun! For this topic, pupils have a booklet each week to help them through tasks, all designed to shape a solo dance routine worthy of TikTok. It is always hard creating solo dances, and I look forward to hearing how their final routine is shaping up!

Year 10 Dance:

There has been no stopping our GCSE year 10 dancers; they have moved straight into learning a solo dance as part of their Performance Unit. Each week the year 10s learn a certain amount, and have been self-assessing themselves along the way.

To keep up their strength and mobility, pupils have been taking online classes with Italia Conti - a performing arts stage school in London. Alongside this, we have been studying 'Shadows', a dance piece by Phoenix Dance Theatre about a poor family in Europe during the 1930s-40s. The dance is open to interpretation about what the 'danger' outside the family's house might be; WW2? Holocaust? The pupils have been coming to their own conclusion, based on the movement and constituent features in the piece.

PERFORMING ARTS

<u>Music</u>

- **Year 7** Music theory. Recently, students in year 7 have been testing and reminding themselves of the musical elements, both reading and writing music in terms of pitch and rhythms.
- **Year 8** Radio stations. Students have been doing some research into what makes a radio station successful with the assessment of creating their own audio recordings of their own radio station.
- **Year 9-** Year 9 have been planning a music event. They have covered everything from artists to venue, finance, publicity and health and safety. They will have understood what is takes to organise a music concert and the links that people make in doing so.
- **Year 10** Year 10 have begun their next set work of John William's 'Star Wars'. They have begun analysing the context, harmony and instrumentation. They have also been working on some compositional techniques at home too.

YEAR 11

We've all enjoyed the opportunity to catch up with many of you in our phone calls home. Year 11 remain positive and upbeat on the whole, and lots of information is being provided via Google Classroom on college applications and transition work to get ready for their new settings. I have contacted lots of our local post 16 providers, and will update information here as I receive it.

- Students have been provided with log in's to BeReady!, a platform designed to support students to learn and prepare for further education and work life.
- Cisco are offering virtual work placements in July to Year 11, so please go to the link in Google Classroom for more information. Places will go fast!

Mr Watterson's dancing was well received in our virtual assembly, and many thanks to Miss Gardner, Altina and Jack C for providing their words of wisdom. Another virtual assembly is in production, so keep checking GC!

YEAR 8, 9 & 10



MATHS



Our students have really shown their dedication towards their education with a high number of students continuing to submit fantastic pieces of work for Maths in all year groups. The Maths Department would like to take this opportunity to say well done to those students and thank you to all parents who continue to understand and support us.

This term Year 7's have been exploring the world of sequences and the properties of parallel lines. Miss Mallon the star behind the Year 7 content has even got the students exploring angles and angle facts! Year 8 higher students followed suit too (with a little more detail of course!). Year 8 foundation students have submerged themselves into understanding the equation of a straight line and have been carrying out mathematical transformations – literally and physically!

Year 9 foundation students have explored equations, inequalities and sequences and dived into exam style questions to build familiarity. But, for Year 9 higher students, it's all been about ratio and proportion. They are now well equipped to make those cookies or cakes for however many members of the family there are and able to adapt a recipe to do this.



Year 10 Set 1 and Set 3 have been exploring equations and inequalities and set 2 have explored the topic of circle geometry and probability. Year 10 work submissions have been impressive and we hope that the students keep preserving. They have everything to play for!

Students in all year groups were also asked to sit an online test on MathsWatch this term. This was a first for the Maths Department too! But, we are so proud of our students in the way in which they managed to log in and complete their assessment forms. It was beautiful to see how they were taking responsibility for their own learning by highlighting the topics that they need to visit. Many also managed to watch the videos for the topics that they were struggling on to deepen their understanding.

Don't forget MathsWatch is not only there for testing but as a resource for all students to use at any time and at their own pace. Get logging in! *Mrs Chopra, Head of Maths*

ENGLISH

Students have been working under some very challenging circumstances and have been producing some excellent work.





Food & Nutrition


