Students are taking their mock exams very seriously, being mindful of last years' GCSE situation, and putting the effort in. Year 11 are also well represented in our relaunched House Captains, and Student Wellbeing Ambassadors.



It was lovely to catch up and chat with the students.

## MAKING LEARNING STICK AT MECE

This term we have been focusing on the power of memory re-call. We started the year with a training session for staff, followed by assemblies and tutor activities for students. Teachers have been encouraging all students to practice retrieving their knowledge whether through questioning in lessons, or specific recall activities or homework.

We know that practicing memory recall is one of the most helpful ways to embed knowledge and make it available for use in later lessons thereby avoiding any 'in one ear and out the other' situations! Students can help themselves by doing this at home too by self-quizzing. This is different from the traditional revising, which often just sees students re-reading information however, we know that re-familiarising is not the same as embedding learning and that recall is much more effective than re-visiting.

Key Stage 4 students have been given Knowledge Organisers that will help them organise their learning for their exams and can be used readily for self-quizzing with a simple 'cover, recall then check' process.






### LAUNCH OF THE HOUSE SYSTEM

Students can bring any homework they would like to work on and will be able to study in a calm learning environment, with access to the internet and support and assistance from staff.




# ENGLISH

### YEAR 7

Year 7 are currently reading 'The Boy at the Back of the Class' by Onjali Rauf. A novel about a new boy starting school and a group of children try to befriend him. They soon learn that Ahmet is a refugee and has been separated from his family.

The novel centres on one of the huge global issues of our time: the refugee crisis. It does so with enormous sensitivity and even humour. The novel has enabled us to look at a difficult topic and allow us to explore the issue and develop our understanding of it's causes.





## YEAR 8

Year 8 are reading 'Of Mice and Men'. A novel which explores attitudes in 1930's America and exploring how the world has moved on from some very difficult topics such as race, loneliness and tolerance.

# YEAR 9


Year 9 are reading the play text 'A View from the Bridge'. The play contrasts the justice dealt out in Italy in ancient times with the justice system of modern America.

### YEAR 10

### YEAR 11

### MATHS

#### YEAR 7 & 8


